Why is calf house hygiene important?

- New born calves
- Pneumonia, scour, Johnes, TB, Ringworm, Navel infections...
- A variety of the above will be present on ALL farms
- Disease pressure
- Persistence within organic matter/muck
- Life long consequences of calf diseases!!!




Plan for health – ask your vet for a veterinary health p

Factors to consider

- Appropriate building
- Sick calves
- Milk feeding equipment cleanliness
- Fresh, clean water/cake/bedding
- Staff hygiene
- All in/all out management

Deep cleaning doesn't need deep pockets





Bedding

• Don't mind but MUST be enough for the calf to 'nest'





 Stocking density (individual pens). Increasing from 2.3m² to 4.1m² decreased airborne pathogens by 50%

NADIS

Cleaning and disinfecting





• Use disinfectants according to the manufacturer's instructions

Deep cleaning doesn't need deep pockets



Summary

- Clean, dry, draft free accommodation
- Access to fresh air, clean water/milk/calf feed
- Thorough steam cleaning and disinfecting between groups
- Attention to detail makes all the difference!
